## 22/131: Reports from District and County Councillors

## Vale of White Horse District Council (VoWHDC)

## Oxfordshire County Council

- Oxfordshire County Council (OCC): Councillor's Priority Fund: The Clerk reported she has enquired as to what amount is available to the Parish Council from the Councillor's Priority Fund, but has not had a reply.

22/141: Proposed pre-school: Results of survey have been published:

85 responses were received representing a $22.7 \%$ return. Of those 53 were in favour, 26 against and 6 that we would categorise as contradictory.

The working group does not have the written in comments from the Village Hall Committee (VHC) as of yet. The VHC met the week of 3rd October and proposed a step-by-step approach with a business and viability plan as the next step in the process.

The Chairman indicated AWEPC cannot make a decision, but acknowledged the Parish Council's previous position that it believes a village pre-school is a worthwhile initiative

The Chairman reported she has spoken with Community First/ACRE Oxfordshire who are willing to assist the VHC and Working Group on the next steps. It was noted that clear communication will be the key to the project progressing.
(SD arrived at this time in the meeting.)
The Chairman advised the Working Group to reach out to any other families/local residents. to see if they are prepared to assist with the project

The possibility of a village meeting to show the plans and next steps to the village was suggested.

SS advised she will step back from the process at this stage. TB happy to remain part of the working group as PC representative in an advisory capacity only.

## 22/137: Street Lighting:

County Councillor J. Ashe arrived at this stage in the meeting. She noted she is unable to attend meetings in person due to schedule, but requested to attend meetings via TEAMS. The Clerk will look into this.

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Update - October 2022

1. To date I have received nothing further wrt the bid by Lioncourt to build 660 houses on land east of Kingston Bagpuize and within the parish of Fyfield \& Tubney. However, I do not expect the bid to be considered until November at the earliest because there is no Planning Committee meeting on the calendar for this month.
2. As you are aware, the government has adopted a policy of exploiting fossil fuel deposits. In addition to planning on granting licences to drill for oil and gas in the North Sea in the 2023, it has also expressed a strong interest in fracking and has inter alia has suggested that it may be carried out in the Vale of the White Horse. Evidently, the council is deeply concerned because the consequences for residents and the environment would be entirely negative. As matters stand at the moment, no viable deposits of shale gas have been found in this area, but even if one were to be identified, the carrying out fracking would result in the following detrimental impacts:-
a) The disruptive effect of heavy vehicle movements on our roads.
b) The seismic risks caused by fracking especially considering the uncertainty about steps to predict and reduce its impact.
c) The potential impact upon our rivers and protected streams.
d) The hugely detrimental potential effect on our Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty.

This government has stated that it would only allow fracking in areas provided that it had the full consent of residents. If the government were to allow any exploration and the extraction of shale gas within the area, local authorities will defend the interests of residents and naturally resist any such fracking exploration and extraction within the Vale of White Horse district given that residents are opposed to it.

In the light of all the evidence available, this council is entirely convinced that fracking for natural gas in the Vale of White Horse would have very detrimental effects on both the residents and the environment. Further to that, fracking is entirely inconsistent with our corporate plan objectives. I should add that this matter is to be brought before the full Council on 12 October 2022.
3. Thames Water: The latest incident at Heyford Hill is just one a number and I think that we can expect more because the pipework infrastructure is ageing and in urgent need of replacement.

HEYFORD HILL BURST PIPE
Full pressurised water supply has now been returned to households and businesses (in OX1, OX2, OX3, OX4, OX9, OX10, OX14, OX33, OX39 (4NA), OX44, HP17 and HP18) that were affected by the burst water main on Tuesday 4 October at the Heyford Hill roundabout on the Oxford Ring Road.

Any residents who experience low water pressure are asked to report the problem by contacting

Thames Water. Residents can also access information on what to expect when the water is back on at Thames Water's website.

Thames Water is working to repair the highway and road surfaces in the affected area and is aiming to reopen the A4142 Eastern Bypass from Heyford Hill to Rose Hill Roundabout by Sunday.

Drivers are still being asked to avoid travelling into Oxford as many roads are congested. Traffic congestion is expected to increase today with football fans travelling to the Oxford United versus Wycombe Wanderers game. Anyone who needs to travel by car, should plan ahead and can check @OxonTravel for updates and the county's park and ride options.

Residents can still collect bottled water from 10am today from the locations below and are asked to check Thames Water's website and Twitter @thameswater for any updates, including any closing times:

## TRAFFIC FILTER PLAN TO SPLIT OXFORD INTO FOUR SECTORS

Further measures to restrict car use in Oxford are out for consultation. 'Traffic filters' are to be introduced with the intention of creating four \&\#39;Sectors\&\#39; within the city: North, South, West and East.

When the traffic filters are operating, for cars without a permit, movement within each sector is unrestricted, but direct movement between sectors is not possible and requires use of the ring road. For example:

- County Hall, Westgate and Oxford station (all in West) will only be accessible via Botley Road, so if you were coming from North, East or South you would need to go via the A34 ring road and then Botley Road


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- The area around St Giles \& Gloucester Green will only be accessible via Banbury or Woodstock Road .

Affected motorists will face much longer journey times and distances. The intention is to force a change in behaviour. The original project description of 'sectorisation' has been dropped as it is felt that 'traffic filters' is a far less controversial term. Leading traders\&\#39; organisation Oxford Business Action Group has slammed the proposals saying in the Oxford Mail: We are concerned that in their current design, the introduction of these six traffic filters will negatively impact many businesses, causing closure for many and catastrophically damaging countless others.\" Parents of children attending school inside the ring road and many whose workplace is in the City may also be affected.

Low traffic neighbourhoods.

## SECONDARY SCHOOL APPLICATION PROCESS OPENS IN OXFORDSHIRE

Parents and guardians can now apply for their Year 6 child to attend a secondary school for September 2023. Applications should be submitted online at:
www.oxfordshire.gov.uk/secondaryadmissions

OCC is encouraging parents and guardians to list four preferences on their application. This doesn't make it less likely that their first preference will be offered. But it does reduce the risk of all preferences being unsuccessful and children being allocated a place at a school that is not named on their list. The deadline for completed applications is 31 October 2022.

Parents and guardians will then be contacted with the result to their application on national offer day, 1 March 2023. It is important to apply on time. Late applications will be processed later in the year and are far less likely to secure places at preferred schools.

SEPTEMBER FULL COUNCIL MEETING DEFERRED UNTIL 7 OCTOBER
Due to the period of mourning, the September meeting of Full Council was deferred until 7 October with no change to the business to be considered.

## LIBDEMS ATTEMPT TO MOVE A MOTION TO CUT VAT

The LibDems put forward a motion to Full Council in July stating Government should immediately introduce various subsidies and cut VAT to $17.5 \%$. The motion was not debated due to lack of time, but is coming back to Full Council at the October meeting. It has been pointed out that whatever the merits or not of the proposal, the administration is once again wasting council resources trying to get involved in central government issues way beyond the council's remit. Councillors are not junior MPs and they should focus on local matters. OCC should be focusing on its core functions of: adult ; children's social care; education learning and highways.

On 5 September we're launching a consultation on proposals to introduce six trial traffic filters in Oxford. Traffic filters are part of our draft Central Oxfordshire Travel Plan and are supported by Oxford City Council. They're designed to reduce traffic, make bus journeys faster

Health visiting and school and college nursing services.
Parents of young people, and healthcare professionals, are being asked for their views on health visiting and school andc ollege nursing services in Oxfordshire. A new survey looks to find out what parents think of the services they have used, their thoughts on what is the most important support and Unauthorised encampments update: South and Vale.
