# **Meet the Patron Saint** – stoking up for St Laurence's Day by the Revd Wealands Bell, Rector

One of the nice (if niche) things about moving to a new parish is the opportunity to get to know your new patron saint. Ours is Laurence, whose name means 'crowned with the victor's laurel-wreath'. Martyred in Rome by the Emperor Valerian in 258CE, he was particularly popular with mediaeval Christians. His prayers were reportedly able to make planks of wood grow to whatever size a carpenter needed, and a church in Milan reported that his intercession had restored a smashed crystal chalice to perfection. A useful man to have around. We are fortunate to have not one but two churches named after him.

The date of a saint's feast-day also suggests how you might mark your 'patronal festival'. With St Laurence on 10<sup>th</sup> August, we might just about hope for some sun, hence the barbeque you'll see mouth-wateringly advertised in this edition. It is a macabrely appropriate way to celebrate: Laurence was not only repeatedly stung by scorpions, but finally cooked to death on a griddle. (The popular insistence that his last words were 'Turn me over: I'm done on this side!' I can neither confirm nor deny.)

You might wonder what he'd done to merit such an end. Christians were a suspect bunch who talked of weird things like eating the body of their Master; they refused to worship the gods of Rome, including those emperors who considered themselves simply divine; and they seemed to foster a kind of namby-pamby concern for the needy, which sat uneasily with the brutal cult of power that was (and to some still is) thought to make the world go around.

It was also feared that Christian refusal to worship the old gods would do little for Roman fortunes in war. So when Valerian was up against it in the mid-3<sup>rd</sup> century, he decided that executing a few Christians might impress Mars and Co. and help on the battle-field. Those in charge also wanted to get their hands on the Church's wealth, but Laurence the Archdeacon had already given it all away to the city's poor: 'These are the Church's only treasures,' he said when arrested, pointing at them and duly suffering the consequences. His moral courage and concern for the weak are wonderful qualities to imitate. Whatever lights we live by, we need to believe that we have chosen wisely, and the courage to persevere even in rather less challenging conditions than his.

And finally, the weather. Star-gazers among you may know that a common name for the 'Perseids' or shooting-stars that are visible on clear nights at his time of year is 'the Tears of St Laurence'. These are at peak visibility on or around 10<sup>th</sup> August: legend has it that the saint's tears flow around the heavens for all eternity, and fall to earth on the night of his feast. Do remember to make a wish. You'd be welcome to come to church as well, to sing some belters, eat something from the griddle, maybe even soak up a few rays.





### **Besselsleigh Woods and Osse Brook**


If you go down to the woods today, you're sure of a big surprise . . . maybe.

Go into Besselsleigh Woods and keep tracking left till you find a fragile bridge across a stream; here is a straight deep cut stream with a sandy base. To the right are the remains of an old stream – now not so clear. It widened out to about ten feet as this was an ancient fishery. Puzzle – why two parallel streams? Both are part of the Osse Brook – that arises in the ponds across the road from the Bear and Ragged Staff in Cumnor. After some ten miles via the River Ock it joins the Thames in Abingdon; 24 hours later it's in the Pool of London.

The aerial photo is hen's tooth rare; I took it after a fall of snow. All the leaves had

fallen so the snow reached the ground. Just enough snow fell to show ground detail – any more would have been a white out.

The photo shows two streams – one wiggly and the other straight – how come?



I hope I can explain next month.

# "Reimagined. Reinvented. Remarkable"

Is anyone watching The Sewing Bee on Tuesday nights on BBC 1? I love the programme - it's right up my street.

This year the programme has become even more interesting because it is focussing more on re-cycling, or re-purposing clothes.. If you haven't seen it, watch it on iplayer. It's fascinating to watch dressmakers (men and women) making garments out of things such as table-cloths, wedding dresses, ties and many other items that would normally be discarded and put into landfill.

#### I was horrified to learn that::

- £140m of clothes goes into landfill each year in the UK that's 10,000 items every 5 minutes.
- Less than one fifth of discarded clothing is recycled.
- By 2030 we'll have created 134 million tonnes of textile waste globally.

We spend £2bn annually on clothes that we only wear once.

This makes pretty uncomfortable reading and I've started to think seriously about how I could make landfill the last resort when it comes to clothing that is 'tired'. The same applies to all the other goods that end up in landfill too.

#### So what can we do?

- We definitely need to halt the trend for fast fashion. The fashion for buying something, wearing it once, needs to stop. The clothes are more than likely to be made overseas and the people making them will not be paid a fair wage and their working conditions are not likely to be great either. If you want some real inspiration take a look at Patrick Grant's company here: https://communityclothing.co.uk. Patrick Grant is the co-presenter of The Sewing Bee and hls company's mission is really inspiring.
- Buy clothes that you love and that will last. Almost certainly more expensive but much more sustainable.
- Buy clothes that have good 'green credentials' if you can.
- Sell your old clothes (and other unwanted stuff) Vinted, Ebay, Facebook marketplace to name a few.
- Look in charity shops you'd be amazed what you can find and donate to them too!
- Repair or repurpose your clothes
- Fix stuff that can be repaired.....

Which brings me neatly on to Green Appleton's idea for a regular repair shop!

We reckon we can fix lots of other things as well as clothes (darning, patching, shortening, repurposing). For instance:

- How about bikes (regular servicing, and repairing),
- Knife sharpening,
- China gluing, painting etc?
- An IT desk where you can ask for advice with apps.

But we need your ideas too! Who's got the skills to help us with this one? Where are the dressmakers, woodworkers, electricians, IT boffins? I'm also willing to bet that you have stuff that you need mending but feel you haven't quite got the skills or equipment to sort it.
