Safely Gathered In – past and future at harvest festival

I'm glad to be back in the reddening landscape of the fruitful fall. The return of the cold and damp has us reaching to the back of the cupboards for the autumnal wardrobe, and for the well-thumbed recipes for solid wintry fare. We may not be able to burrow down and hibernate until the spring, but we can nevertheless arm ourselves with the comforts and consolations of the darkening season.

I well remember the harvests of my childhood, half a century back: the sunburn and calamine lotion; riding high on the combine with old Jack Cunningham, who every now and then would leap from his seat and hurl himself on some startled rabbit that had broken cover at the approach of the all-devouring monster through the sheltering wheat. We kids loved to rattle round in the back of the trailer, until the full tank of cascading corn fell in a dusty golden deluge, filling first our wellies, then the trailer itself. Then we clambered out and clung to the sides, riding in bumpy style between field and farm.

Harvest Festival was quickly upon us, and focus moved from farm to church, where every holy nook was festooned with decorative loaves, 'corn-dollies', and whatever vegetables the keenest gardeners could coax from the soil. There was a feast: the village hall was filled with rickety chairs and trestle-tables, not too far short of groaning with the prodigious weight of food produced by a brigade of highly competitive 'good plain cooks'.

At the service in church, quite contented farmers were seen with their more familiar wives, sucking mint imperials, and standing like sentries in reinforced tweed. Nothing would get past these serious men who'd come to pay their annual dues to a God who held the success of the harvest in his hands. They sang *Harvest home* with gusto, thankful that all was safely gathered in, and daring to hope for the following year.

Every harvest contains an unspoken fear of failure, the dread that hunger may come seeking and finding us one day soon, just as surely as it finds so many others across the globe. And while I would not recommend churchgoing as an insurance policy in quite the way the farmers of my childhood seemed to practise it, it's good to see the universe not as a random accumulation of cells, but as a place of order and purpose, the work of a loving and creative God. Our gratitude then might yield thanksgiving, and invite generosity – to the poor and hungry; to those fleeing war; even these days to the very fabric and fibre of the earth itself.

I look forward to meeting many of you at the **Harvest Supper** on 4th October, and in **Church** on 6th **at 10am**. Please also note opportunities to commemorate our **departed loved ones** at the beginning of **November**. Details of this, and a **half-term Messy Church event**, elsewhere in this edition.

Autumn may be a time of mists mellow fruitfulness according to Keats, but it's a time of warming foods according to us! Stock up on our pre-cooked meals (meat, fish and veggie options), our tasty autumnal vegetables (butternut squash, beetroot, etc.), and indulge in some warming puds and sweet treats.

Friday supper club: whole stuffed peppers

A great recipe when you have leftovers to use up. Buy 1 or more of our large peppers (red, green or yellow), cut the top out carefully (it will become the lid) and carve out the insides and seeds. Prepare the stuffing with leftover cooked rice, seasoned with anything you fancy (mince, finely chopped meat, halloumi or other cheese, veggies, onions, herbs, etc.) and season well (more than you think – perhaps a little curry powder, or other spices). Stuff the inside as full as you can and rub a little oil on the outside of the pepper. Put the "lid" back on the top and roast for about 40min in a hot oven until soft and juicy.



Besselsleigh Woods – two streams

The wiggly and straight steams in the woods are a puzzle.

The history of the issue dates back some 80 years. Howard Cornish - who farmed the land was short of men – WW2 had taken many to war; but an unexpected source emerged. Prisoners of war were aplenty and some were happy to act as farmhands. Thus it was that Mr Cornish of West Farm took in some Italian POWs to work on his farm; one at first but four all told.



The POWs had were trained in basic farming matters, horses and equipment – and made good farmhands.

The stream (Osse Brook) that ran through the woods – it was forever breaking its banks – troubled Mr Cornish. He decided that a new cut was needed and his Italian men were told to cut a new channel for some 300 yards upstream of the old fishery. This fishery may have been the site of the Sturgeon Pool listed in the village Charters of 942 and 968 AD.

Thus the Italians dug a new deep and straight cut beside the old and troublesome English stream – an Italian job. This new cut survives today but it has needed occasional tidying up in its 80 years.

I heard that the Italians returned home after WW2 – and that some had stayed on; but this wasn't true.
