WELCOME TO 2025

Gold, Frankincense, and a big slice of ordinariness

Happy New Year! I do hope you're coping in this harsh retail wasteland between Christmas and Valentine's Day. What on earth are we to do, with literally nothing to spend our money on? I can offer only the scantest comfort of reminding us that, with our arrival at Epiphany on 6 January, the Church is still only half way through the Christmas season, turning its attention away from simple shepherds and the stinking menagerie of St Luke's Gospel, to set up house with the Holy Family in down-town Bethlehem, just in time to welcome their exotic quests from the East, who slide off their bad-tempered camels and open up their precious gifts. And no, this is *not* the wise men's masterclass in buying perfect birthday presents for new-borns. These gifts are in code, informing us that this ordinary and entirely human baby is in fact our King (hence the gold), our God (incense) and our Saviour (myrrh, a bitter resin, symbol of sacrifice). Gifts of a pale lemon sleeping-suit and a Fisher-Price activity centre would no doubt have been more practical, but they would have more than somewhat missed the point. In Jesus, God is taking on our human nature, so that we can take on something of the divine nature.

As well as this story, we bring in the New Year by turning our attention to the sign of the water-become-wine at Cana of Galilee. This is emphatically not a story about keeping our booze bills in sensible proportions. Rather, it invites us to ponder the changes that might occur if and when we invite God to transform through love the ordinary things of life.

On the whole, we humans are fairly useless at living with our own ordinariness, and we do almost anything to disguise it. We dress it in finery and designer labels; and spray on the veneer of a shinier car, or a slightly further upmarket postcode. We might flee our flesh-and-blood communities by taking refuge in fantasy or the virtual world; or we build façades, or claim beliefs we do not hold, all to distract us from embracing the *who* and *how* we really are.

New Year is a good time to think about all this. We don't particularly need to get into the whole thing of resolutions if we don't want to. But just to ask that most basic questions about being an ordinary human will be useful and interesting. It might help us to accept who we are, to love and forgive ourselves in ways we might not usually manage. And if we start to value ourselves properly, we might look after ourselves a bit better; maybe even start to value other people as they also deserve. Heaven knows, we might even begin to ask ourselves whether we have grown out of God quite as much as we think we have. The answer to that question may be a real surprise. And, as always, if you want to talk about it, you know where to find me.


Appleton Voluntary Transport Scheme (AVTS)

Appleton History - Night Sky

Appleton eyes will have long looked at the night sky. The mystery of the changing scenes of moon, stars, planets, comets and shooting stars would have formed many stories.

One of the most striking stellar winter views is that of Orion – The Hunter. He stands feet apart with his arms high above holding his weapons. Below his feet is the brightest star Sirius - his dog. Orion wears a belt – of three stars – mysteriously linked to the Pyramids of Giza.

From his belt hangs his sword – a tight group of stars and a cloudy nebula – all together a rather misty visage. Surprisingly modern phone cameras can take good photographs of the details of his sword and similar sky scenes.

Phone cameras can usually "see" well into the invisible infrared part of the spectrum; often about 100% more spectral range. Hand held cameras usually have this option filtered out. Most cameras now have vibration reduction systems that help to reduce image shake.

On a clear night with a dark black sky find Orion and point your phone camera to just below his belt of three stars. Steady your camera against a doorframe or similar


